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




A Taste of Italy at NBHS

Students in the New Britain High School Culinary Program were recently treated to a unique opportunity that featured more than just delicious food.

Joe Tropea, the owner of Angelo's Market in New Britain, visited the program to share a cooking demonstration with hands-on participation by students, followed by a question and answer session allowing the students to learn more about Tropea's day-to-day and the behind-the-scenes of running a successful business.

"It was something new for us. Mr. Tropea has a business, he is successful, he is from here too, so that's good to see," said senior Jomar Rodriguez. "It was fun. I love culinary now; it's probably my favorite class and program in the school." The culinary program at NBHS is one of four pathways in the school's Academy of Business and Finance. The academy is accredited by the National Academy Foundation, receiving merit recognition of distinction multiple times, as well as the National Restaurant Association. Chefs Brian Crowley and James Nelson run the program.



"I was hoping that the students could see from the perspective that I share from my past life being a restaurant owner. Joe from Angelo's shared that same exact passion and honesty about what food really means to people, to the world, jobs, and everything else that the kids are looking forward to," said Chef Nelson. "I think the most rewarding part was to see that what we teach here in culinary is true and is honest. Hard work pays off."

Angelo's Market was founded in 1956 by an Italian opera singer named Angelo, who later mentored a young Italian immigrant, Tropea, in the ways of fine butchery, meat curing, Italian cuisine and traditional Italian grocery. Decades later, Tropea successfully owns and operates Angelo's with a 'new-world twist to this old-world deli.' The market caters



to hundreds of events annually and has been rated the #1 Deli in Connecticut by various prestigious organizations.

"I came here when I was a kid, and I have attachments to New Britain. I was given a chance when I was a kid and had a lot of mentors growing up," said Tropea commenting on why he brought his talents to NBHS. "I'm hoping to give back to the community. Sometimes kids in school need somebody's feedback from the outside and to experience something different."

Angelo D'Alfonso, NBHS work-based learning advisor, said setting up opportunities like this one is a rewarding piece of his work as he is able to open doors for students involved in all of the academy pathways, not just culinary, to help them pursue their careers of choice in the community.

"My role through the work-based learning here allows me to give the students here in the culinary department an opportunity to see someone who started off their age way back when and now has a successful business that he has. Not only on the cooking side of it but also on the business side of it. I want these kids to know that yeah, being a chef is great but also what comes with it as far as running a successful business," said D'Alfonso. "I've known Chef Joe since he was their age, so it was rewarding for me to see these kids actually learn and see firsthand from someone who started out as they are at this age."

As the NBHS Academies offer high school students a unique opportunity to explore potential careers, academy graduates are better prepared for college, career, and future success as the program design 'ignites students' passion for learning and gives businesses the opportunity to shape America's future workforce.'

"It's nice to see young adults make a difference in the community, and it's nice to hear when kids from our community become successful and go on to do bigger and better things," said Tropea.

The experience with Tropea even opened a door for a potential new career ambition for Rodriguez.

"What did I learn from today? I can make pasta! I usually always burn it. I learned It takes teamwork to run a successful restaurant. Not only one person can do it. You need staff. If you have good staff, you can build yourself up to be successful," said Rodriguez. "In the future, I wouldn't mind being a chef. I think that's what I'd like to do, but I'm trying to play baseball in college and maybe become a police officer, but I wouldn't mind being a chef."




Family Game Night A Success at HALS

Carmine and Frank Mangini Foundation Continues to Support New Britain

Since the Fall of 2020, The Carmine and Frank Mangini Foundation has generously supported New Britain teachers, coaches, and support personnel with grant awards of up to \$500 to address their instructional wish lists. Grant windows open 2-3 times a year. Staff complete a grant application detailing their project, and the grantee is notified if their request has been awarded.

The most recent application window opened on February 1. Out of over 20 schools and programs that make up the Consolidated School District of New Britain, 12 received grant awards this cycle with a total of 32 grants awarded to CSDNB employees. Grants were funded to support gardening, STEM exploration, Phonics instruction, recess, and social-emotional supports in the classroom like flexible seating and headphones. This school year Learning Ally is available to all teachers and students in CSDNB:



Coaching Cycles Inspiring Growth

Coaching has taken center stage in CSDNB in supporting and growing our teachers. CSDNB believes in the impact and importance of coaching. Teachers, like Kassie Hinrich at Smith Elementary School, have embraced coaching.

"As a veteran teacher, I found the Math coach [at my school] to be extremely helpful when diving into a new Math curriculum. She taught me the importance of a pacing and planning guide and how to use the guide efficiently incorporating learning targets and success criteria. In any new curriculum, there were many new strategies to learn, and the coach encouraged me to reach outside the box and try something new," said Hinrich.

Teachers enter into Coaching Impact Cycles to target a specific area of growth. These areas are identified by the teacher, and the cycle is born. With coaches spending at least 60% of their day coaching and supporting teachers, our teachers have seen the impact on their practice.

"Our coaches are very supportive. They are always willing to listen when we need advice and value our opinions. They consistently work in my classroom and provide constructive feedback. The students are always very excited to see them and so am I," said Gaffney Teacher Alexandra Simboski. "[My] coaching cycle for ELA has proven extremely successful! Kim Bycenski (Gaffney's Instructional Coach) is a wealth of knowledge."

Overall, we are excited to continue working with our coaches and teachers as we move our district forward.






Accessing Forms in PowerSchool



WHAT IS THE MAIN PURPOSE OF RAMADAN?

Fasting is important during Ramadan as it allows Muslim to devote themselves to their faith, get closer to Allah (God) and learn patience and compassion. It's about nourishing your soul, rather than only focusing on your physical body. It's also one of the Five Pillars of Islam which are the foundation of how Muslims live their lives. The remaining pillars of Islam are as follows, The declaration of faith, prayer, alms-giving, and pilgrimage to the holy city of Mecca for those who are able.

Muslims are obligated to fast, except those who are sick, pregnant, nursing mothers, menstruating, elderly, or traveling. If you miss fasting days you can make up for them throughout the year.

RAMADAN THIS YEAR

Ramadan in 2023 is expected to fall on Thursday, March 23, though it will be confirmed, closer to the time with an official moon sighting. If this is the case, the 30-day annual fast will end on Friday, April 21, with Eid Al-Fitr Celebration on April 22.

ABOUT RAMADAN

Ramadan is a holy month of fasting, prayer, reflection and community for Muslims. It is celebrated as the month in which Muhammad received the initial revelations of the Quran, known as the holy book for Muslims. Fasting is one of the five fundamental principles of Islam. Each day during Ramadan, Muslims do not eat or drink from dawn to sunset. They are also supposed to avoid impure thoughts and bad behavior.
