

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

COMPUTING CHALLENGE KICKOFF!

CT Lt. Governor Launches Coding Competition at Smith Elementary School

Connecticut Lt. Governor Susan Bysiewicz greeted fourth and fifth graders at Smith Elementary School on December 5, 2022 to kick off this year's Lt. Governor's Computing Challenge.

The challenge, a statewide "Coding for Good" competition, is open to all Connecticut students in grades 3 through 12. Students are encouraged to create applications designed to inspire health and wellness for all.

"We're honored to host the Lieutenant Governor for this important kickoff. New Britain's schools are on the rise and we're thankful for the support and partnership with

our community and state agencies," said Dr. Tony Gasper, Superintendent of Schools. "The Computing Challenge is a great opportunity for students to apply what they've learned in the classroom to a real-life situation and see themselves as creators of technology. Whether students are presenting an idea for an app, a prototype, or a fully developed app, this experience is truly critical thinking and problem solving brought to life."

Last year, New Britain High School students Fares Ahmed, Casper Adamus, and Michelle Prucnal (pictured above) took home The Jackson Urban Achievement Award in the challenge. All three were present at last month's kick-

Wreaths Across America Makes Convoy Stop in New Britain

We were honored to host Wreaths Across America at New Britain High School on December 8, 2022 as an official stop on their Escort to Arlington Convoy 2022. The convoy, the country's longest veterans' parade, made the stop on their way to deliver over 300,000 wreaths to Arlington National Cemetery for National Wreaths Across America Day. Over 50 vehicles make up the convoy including at least a dozen 18 wheelers of wreaths and a bus load of Gold Star and Blue Star families.

"The City of New Britain is honored to be one of this year's Escort to Arlington stops as the convoy travels to Arlington National Cemetery," said Mayor Erin E. Stewart. "This event is a reflection of our community's stead-

fast commitment to honoring the sacrifice of all who bravely answered the call to serve our great country."

Mayor Stewart took part in the ceremony at NBHS along with; State Representative Donna Veach (Berlin/Southington), who is chair of the Wreaths Across America of New Britain initiative; Peter Scirpo, Commander of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), Hardware City Chapter 8; Major Daniel Eddinger, U.S. Army (retired), Vietnam veteran, recipient of two Purple Hearts and Commander of the Department of Connecticut Military Order of the Purple Heart; Wreaths Across America Board Chairman Wayne Hansen and Executive Director Karen Worcester: and New Britain High School students and

groups including the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) and Madrigal singers.

Gr. 3-8 Interim Assessment Blocks


For the first time since COVID, all Grade 3-8 students embarked on taking the Interim Assessment Blocks (IABs). These assessments are valuable as they provide teachers with an additional tool that measures students' mastery of specific content and skills aligned to the Connecticut Core Standards. Teachers were able to implement the first of three assessments that students will take this school year. IABs are also a great way for students to practice for the Smarter Balance Assessment (SBA) in the Spring. Students are getting the opportunity to practice using the platform and its accompanying tools, mirroring what they will see on SBA.



Teachers Study Group: FUNdations®

Grade 1 and Grade 2 teachers participated in FUNdations study groups and spent time analyzing the most recent unit assessments. Teachers looked at the results, discussed noticings and wonderings, reviewed and planned for intervention and reassessment needs of our students, and made decisions for instruction based on data. In addition, they previewed and discussed upcoming units.

FUNdations is a word study program that teaches reading, spelling, and handwriting skills in a multisensory way. The program complements a core literacy program.

Bridges Middle School Program Update

Teachers, staff, and students at the Bridges Middle School program are setting high expectations for students and promoting a positive learning environment. Students in the program work on daily on task behaviors which earns program points. Students can then exchange the points for class and program incentives as well as earning access to additional mainstream classes as they strengthen their social-emotional and behavioral skills. This point system is a critical part of the Small Classroom Management program used at Bridges. Two seventh grade students recently earned enough points to purchase new bikes.







NBHS Computer Science Students Strive to "Solve for Tomorrow"

Through the work of its AP Computer Science class, New Britain High School was selected as a state finalist in the Samsung 'Solve for Tomorrow' competition and will receive a \$2,500 reward. The class entered the competition and identified hallway traffic as an area where they could use their coding skills to better the community. The students will be working to create a digital hallway pass system to simplify the pass system used at the High School and improve the school climate. With a digital hall pass, paper passes would no longer be needed, and teachers would be able to issue digital passes through their computers. The system may even sync with PowerSchool to allow teachers to check if building locations are too busy for additional students.

The Samsung 'Solve for Tomorrow' competition challenges students to apply their learning to real-world problems and celebrates students working to improve their community locally or globally. In the next phase of the competition, 50 state winners will be selected and awarded \$20,000 in technology and supplies. 

8th Graders Take A Look Ahead




CSDNB's DEI Advisory Committee

The council was formed with the belief that our collective efforts are a powerful force that will improve equity, inclusion, access, advocacy and awareness for all within the school district and community at large. Personnel & Talent Development Update

The Personnel & Talent Development Department would like to thank all of our cooperating teachers and clinical supervisors for a successful Fall semester of hosting and mentoring aspirant educators.

The Department continues to work extremely hard to recruit and promptly onboard teachers, especially special education teachers. CSDNB currently has a vacancy rate of approximately less than 5% which is comparable to this time last year. LAS Links Testing

LAS Links testing will begin in January for all identified Multilingual Learners (MLs) in Connecticut. The LAS Links is an integrated suite of English language proficiency assessments consisting of four sections: Speaking, Listening, Reading and Writing. The purpose of the LAS Links is to track the progress of Multilingual Learners (MLs) in Connecticut as well as the primary tool for exiting students from Multilingual Learner status. CSDNB Multilingual Learners will observe the following testing schedule:

Chamberlain Construction Progress

The construction project at Chamberlain is approximately 90% complete. Outside work is wrapping up, light poles are being installed and the final landscaping has been planted. All HVAC equipment is installed on the roof and is being commissioned. The interior of the building is also nearing completion. Final finishes include the installation of VCT and rubber flooring and final coats of paint being applied. The larger rooms including the gym, auditorium and cafeteria are coming alive with new lighting, flooring and seating as well. The new furniture will be delivered on January 9 and staged throughout the build-



Slade Middle School New Roof Project

Our Project management team has started work on the design and planning stages to replace the roof at Slade Middle School. This \$4 Million-dollar project will ensure the longevity of the building and increase energy efficiency of the building. Funding for this project has been made possible through the Mayor's office and The Common Council. The first phase of the project includes design, testing and planning. The project is expected to go out to bid for a roofing company over the next few months. As an added bonus phase of the roof project, CSDNB is working on securing grant money to upgrade the HVAC equipment as well. This HVAC improvement phase will bring air conditioning and improved ventilation to the entire building.



The above 3D Model of the building is being drawn so architects can properly design a new roof system.

Over the Christmas break, as a first step in the project, Special Projects Manager Robert Smedley and a team of architects and environmentalists took samples of the existing roof to check for hazardous materials. These samples will be evaluated at a lab and a process will be designed to safely remove any hazardous materials in the demolition phase of the project.





School Messenger and Clever Portal


